Countdown with turtles as they enter the pond one by one. Ten turtles gather in the late afternoon to bask in the sun. Each time a woodland creature startles them, one jumps into the pond until the last turtle joins his friends at sunset for sleep at the bottom of the pond. The final pages of the book give factual information about most of the creatures depicted and instructions about how to make leaf prints. For children in grades Preschool-1.
